


In the federal judiciary, the court libraries serve federal judges and court staff including circuit, district, magistrate, and bankruptcy courts, by supporting their research and information needs. The librarians assist with legal research using online databases as well as print materials. The libraries' collections consists of federal legal research materials as well as state legal research materials limited to their geographic regions. Print materials include case opinions, statutes, court rules, jury instructions, and treatises covering most subject areas of American Law, as well as form books, law reviews, and finding aids. Legislative history materials are also available.

## Fifth Circuit Libraries Open to the Public

The Fifth Circuit has nine libraries located within the circuit and a select few are open to the public. Reference librarians are available to assist patrons with locating materials in the library, accessing the online catalog and public computers, and using materials like microfiche. Reference librarians can also give basic guidance on how to use the materials within the collection. However, the librarians cannot give legal advice, interpret any laws or legal documents, or perform legal research for the public.
